Groups & Families Discussion Questions

Follow along with the sermon and use these questions to dive a little deeper with your group, with your families at home or for your own personal reflection.

Sermon Notes: Can you identify the main point, the subpoints and application of today's message?

Life Group Questions

1. Conversation Starter: When you were a child, what was something that felt terribly unfair to you?
2. Psalm 94 begins by crying out, “Rise up, Judge of the earth” and asking, “How long, LORD?” (v2–3). Why do you think the Bible gives us permission to speak to God this honestly?
3. Psalm 94 teaches us to bring our pain to God, not bury it (v2–3). When people face evil or suffering, what are some unhealthy ways they commonly deal with their pain?
4. Psalm 94 says, “Judgment will again be founded on righteousness” and that God will repay the wicked (v15, 23). Why is it hard to keep trusting God when evil is not dealt with immediately?
5. Psalm 94 asks, “Who will rise up for me against the wicked?” (v16). How does Jesus ultimately answer that question through his death and resurrection? See also 1 Peter 2:24 and Colossians 2:15.
6. Psalm 94 calls us to stand against evil while we wait for God to end it (v16, 23). What might it look like for ordinary Christians to stand against evil without becoming bitter, vengeful, or self-righteous?
7. Psalm 94 says, “When I said, ‘My foot is slipping,’ your unfailing love, LORD, supported me” (v18), and “the LORD has become my fortress” (v22). Can you think of a time when God did not immediately remove the trouble, but did support you through it?
